

## Homebound Spiritual Gifts?

Romans 12:6 Since we have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, each of us is to exercise them accordingly... (NASB95)

For years, people who are drained of energy when required to be with groups of people have jokingly called for solidarity among their ranks by proclaiming that all introverts should "unite, separately, in your own homes". The irony is obvious. Being together cannot be sustained in absentia. We simply must gather to experience biblical oneness.
