Summary of 1:3-12:

- Our 'new begetting' gives us immeasurable blessings we can look forward to in the end.
- That future hope enables us to endure any suffering in the meantime because trials prove our faith is real and because proven faith brings Christ the most glory.
- Christ's glory is our chief motivation if we truly love Him.

1 Pet. 1:13–16 – Therefore, prepare your minds for action, keep sober in spirit, fix your hope completely on the grace to be brought to you at the revelation of Jesus Christ. ¹⁴As obedient children, do not be conformed to the former lusts which were yours in your ignorance, ¹⁵but like the Holy One who called you, be holy yourselves also in all your behavior; ¹⁶because it is written, "You shall be holy, for I am holy."

<u>Col. 1:21</u> – And although you were formerly alienated and hostile in **mind**, engaged in evil deeds,

Matt. 22:37 – And He said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind."

'Keeping sober' –

<u>1 Pet. 4:7</u> – The end of all things is near; therefore, **be** of sound judgment and **sober** [spirit] for the purpose of prayer.

<u>1 Pet. 5:8</u> – **Be** of **sober** [spirit], be on the alert. Your adversary, the devil, prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour.

 The command: Fix our hope completely on the grace to be brought to us at the revelation of Jesus Christ.
Where we place our is what we orient our whole lives around.
We have to focus on the grace
Before we try to do anything else in our faith, we have to first root our hope securely and unwaveringly in Christ and in our ultimate salvation to come.
II. What Controls Our (vv14–16)
 Our holy living comes first from being obedient —————.
 This obedience involves not conforming to our former
Before Christ, we were fully controlled by the sinful impulses within us.
Eph. 2:3 – Among them we too all formerly lived in the lusts of our flesh, indulging the desires of the flesh and of the mind , and were

by nature children of wrath, even as the rest.

 Sin still lives in our flesh even though God's Spirit gives us the ability to have victory over it (cf. Rom. 7:14–25).

Rom. 12:2 – And do not be **conformed** to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, so that you may prove what the will of God is, that which is good and acceptable and perfect.
