■ The Cornerstone —	

<u>1 Pet. 2:4–8</u> – And coming to Him as to a living stone which has been rejected by men, but is choice and precious in the sight of God, ⁵you also, as living stones, are being built up as a spiritual house for a holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. ⁶For this is contained in Scripture:

"Behold, I lay in Zion a choice stone, a precious **corner stone**,
And he who believes in Him will not be disappointed."

⁷This precious value, then, is for you who believe; but for those who disbelieve,

"The stone which the builders rejected.

"The stone which the builders rejected, This became the very **corner stone**," ⁸and,

"A stone of stumbling and a rock of offense"; for they stumble because they are disobedient to the word, and to this doom they were also appointed.

<u>Eph. 2:19–20</u> – So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are fellow citizens with the saints, and are of God's household, 20 having been built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus Himself being the **corner stone**,

• Sidebar: Symbolism in Scripture

- When we say we read the Bible literally, we mean we take it exactly as
 it would have been read by its original audience (as far as we can tell).
- We want to avoid the extremes of reinterpreting Scripture to say what we want AND of ignoring the obvious figurative language of the Bible.
- Read things literally until it doesn't make sense, and take context and genre into account.
